SIR DAVID ATTENBOROUGH

Key Stage 1

Research into one of the species from a wildlife documentary watched in class and present the findings back to class, or via a different medium.
Create a park or wildlife reserve scene, with animals, trees and highlighting the different jobs that people can do in the area.
Challenge the class to find out 10 interesting facts to tell the class or create a poster.

Key Stage 2

Research into Sir David Attenborough's achievements, milestones and impact throughout his career and present this back via a suitable method.
Research advancements in technology that have an impact in how we view wildlife and the environment. For example, how film crews achieve their breath taking shots or how they reach the incredible depths of the open ocean. Consider viewing a short section of documentary and analyse the techniques used.

Choose a favourite naturalist and write an autobiography, create a portrait or compose a speech.

Discuss the different roles that people play within a protected reserve or science as a whole, for example field researcher, presenter, marine biologist,

Role play an interview with Sir David Attenborough, Steve Backshall or another wildlife personality. Spend time preparing and writing questions.
