In the last newsletter we told you about our Strategic Plan, the roadmap to support WLT partners so that they can save at least one million hectares by 2025. We asked you to help us fund

as much conservation action in five years as we have in the prior 30 – and you have risen to the challenge.

Preparing this WLT News issue, there were simply too many stories of your impact to fit within eight pages: the Project Mongma Rama appeal supporters who (see next page) helped us raise £350,000 so that our partner Wildlife Trust of India and the Garo people can safeguard a key elephant corridor; the progress with the land protection funded by those of you

who donated to our 2021 appeals in Borneo (see below) and Guatemala (see back cover); new reserves in Africa, gamechanging wildlife sightings in Armenia and more. Like us, you might have been worrying about the planetary

breakdown headlines these past few months. We're not going to deny that some of the environmental changes we're seeing are starting to become quite terrifying. However, we must never lose hope. That's why we wanted to remind you about the difference you've been making and could now make, more than ever, this Big Match Fortnight (see pages 4-7). With our partner Fundación EcoMinga we can save Ecuadorian forests from destruction and in these uncertain and challenging

Third consecutive leopard seen at haven saved with Action Fund's help



Consider this, Action Fund supporters: fewer than 15 Caucasian Leopards are thought to be left in Armenia but three were filmed - within months of each other - in reserves protected with your help. The sighting of Neo (male), Nova (female) and now another male at our partner FPWC's refuge is fuelling hope for the species, and your donations have played a decisive part. Last year's Borneo appeal unlocks top legal protection for habitats



Last year, our £150,000 Borneo appeal raised £420,000 – and your donations are already delivering. As you can read in our update (check our News web section or reach out to donations@worldlandtrust.org for a copy), our partner HUTAN has now purchased two plots of some of Earth's most biodiverse land for the highest protection, and more purchases will follow.

Giraffes, zebras, elephants, rhinos – these and more were at risk of losing habitats to plantations in South Africa's KwaZulu-Natal province before new WLT partner Wild Tomorrow Fund acted, creating the Greater Ukuwela Nature Reserve to link two pre-existing protected areas. Action Fund donations were key, funding the last reserve sections that required protection.

To those who donated to our Project Mongma Rama appeal earlier in 2022: thank you. Because you acted, our campaign raised £350,000 and now our partner Wildlife Trust of India (WTI) can protect a fourth corridor of a network in the lush Garo Hills of Meghalaya State thousands of hectares saved for elephants, pangolins, hornbills, gibbons, and you made it possible.

This year in Ecuador, WLT supporters have a chance to bring about a powerful win for global conservation. Our Big Match Fortnight will triple your appeal donations in support of Fundación EcoMinga, who have a plan to save forests within one of the world's most biodiverse regions. Together, we can expand reserves before deforestation is allowed to take hold, in life-packed Andean foothills where every hectare we protect could be home to species as yet unknown to science.

One of South America's great ecoregions, the Eastern Cordillera Real montane forests unfurl east of the Andes like a vast green trail, 900-plus miles north to south, from Colombia to Ecuador and Peru. Shaped by elevation, isolation and precipitation, the mist-shrouded canopy is a home fit for rich, unique life. Eagles, New World monkeys, bears, big cats, dazzling orchids, emerald frogs, crimson forest birds - all find shelter in the wooded fragments still clinging on these steep slopes east of the Andes.

It is here that two majestic Ecuadorian valleys, full of spectacular life, can be found. To the east of the Abitagua Range, Río Anzu's rainforest remnants and limestone caves boast one of the world's highest diversities of amphibian and reptile species. To the west, Río Zúñac's cloud forests routinely yield discoveries of plant species not found anywhere else on Earth. The two landscapes are united in the threats they face as much as in their shared beauty: oil extraction projects have been proposed nearby and plantations would most likely follow as roads expand. But you can stop this.

Steve Backshall helped WLT fund another Río Zúñac Reserve expansion in 2019, and then saw a newly discovered species – Backshall's Plump Toad, pictured above – named after him. The WLT Patron recently said: "Since then, the toad has been followed by yet more new discoveries, each a reminder of just how important these forests are, and what we stand to lose if we don't save them."

From (left to right) Meriania aurata trees to Masdevallia stigii orchids or what scientists believe could be a new poison dart frog species, nearly 100 new species have been discovered in the Upper Pastaza Watershed. Your donations to expand EcoMinga's reserves will help to ensure more can be found before it's too late.

These forests are the most important known Black-and-chestnut Eagle habitat left in Ecuador, as well as the home of the Spectacled Bear and big cats like the Jaguar. The land protected by your donations will join a vast network, helping to preserve the connectivity that these roamers need for their long-term population health.

THE MOST STRATEGIC LAND

The land your donations fund could not be more critical. It will help to enlarge reserves in what is seen, in Ecuador, as the weakest link between the Andes and the Amazon. The reserve additions will connect all of Río Anzu's pre-existing, individual protected plots to one another, as well as to the Los Llanganates National Park and, by extension, to the also-expanded Río Zúñac Reserve. Once all purchases take place, they will be added to a 1.6-million-ha protected network – an area nearly twice the size of Cyprus guarded by rangers like EcoMinga's Santiago Recalde (pictured above).

CONSERVATION LED BY LOCALS

This area of Ecuador is not just part of one of the world's most biodiverse regions; it is also the home of communities at Mera and other nearby towns. Once the reserves are expanded with your help, they will be patrolled by locally hired conservationists, including WLT-funded Keepers of the Wild such as Jordy Salazar (pictured to the left). Communities of this landslide-prone area will also see soil and climate benefits as carbon-storing trees are kept standing. In addition, EcoMinga will help them embrace ecotourism as an alternative to extractive industries.

SAVING AN EVOLUTIONARY ISLAND

The location of the Río Anzu and Río Zúñac reserves is no accident. Studying this area years ago - the Abitagua Range, the last mountain line before the largely flat Amazon Basin – EcoMinga created both protected spaces to cover the elevations where biodiversity is highest, up 1,700-1,800 metres where near-constant clouds form over the slopes. In the words of EcoMinga President Lou Jost (pictured to the left): "The vegetation abruptly changes above this line, and so do the frogs. Scientists who make it this far are treated to an evolutionary island every bit as interesting as the Galápagos."

Laguna Grande, one year on What Big Match Fortnight 2021 donations have done for a haven of Guatemala

If you're wondering what difference you could make through this year's Big Match Fortnight (BMF) in Ecuador, we've got a story for you: the transformation already delivered by donations to last year's BMFbacked appeal – Guardians of Nimla Ha'. In late 2021, WLT supporters allowed us to raise our most ambitious appeal in history, enough to save a tropical paradise of Guatemala. One year on, a better future is already taking shape for people and planet.

Like Ecuador's Río Anzu and Río Zúñac, Guatemala's Laguna Grande is a place the world cannot afford to lose: near-pristine forests, mangroves and wetlands for 700+ species; a flood barrier and water filter for local people; a carbon sink for all on Earth. Armed with the £1,370,000+ raised through the Guardians of Nimla Ha' appeal in 2021, our partner FUNDAECO has already completed the tripling of the Laguna Grande Reserve's size to 2,023 ha (5,000 acres), all of which will enjoy the highest protection under Guatemalan law.

Because WLT supporters funded these hectares last year, FUNDAECO can go on mapping out and protecting Laguna Grande's breathtaking life. A three-year monitoring programme for West Indian Manatees – this lagoon is their top breeding habitat in Caribbean Guatemala – is already underway. Over 110 bird species were counted in a recent survey, including a returning hummingbird visitor (the Band-tailed Barbthroat) whose comeback brought "great joy" to FUNDAECO's rangers.

Assistant Marta Tiul Cabnal is leading efforts to ensure the project benefits local Maya Q'eqchi' people through health clinics, women workshops, and more. This is the power of WLT supporters: habitat saved for
